**WALTER BROWER ANNOTATES!**



Walter Brower (Hopewell, NJ) who finished tied for first in the 2006 Absolute Championship shares his thoughts with this fighting draw against veteran Kristo Miettinen.

**ENGLISH OPENING (A12)**  
**White: Walter Brower (2390)**  
**Black: Kristo Miettinen (2369)**  
**2006 Absolute**

**1.c4 c6 2.Nf3 d5 3.b3 Bf5 4.g3 Nf6**

Black reverses the usual order of move 3 and 4.

**5.Bg2 e6 6.Bb2 Nbd7 7.0-0 Bd6**

More popular are 7...h6 and 7...Be7.  
**8.d3 0-0 9.Nbd2**

ECO's line

**9...Qc7?!**

This was new to me; ECO shows 9...e5  
10. cxd5 cxd5 11. Rc1 Qe7 = with Reti-Lasker, 1924 after four more moves.

**10.Rc1**

10. Nh4 chases a Bishop uselessly and puts a Knight on the rim.

**10...Rfe8 11.cxd5**

Seemed slightly advantageous at this point.

**11...exd5 12.Nd4**

Hardly a threat, but keeps the initiative

**12...Bg6**

Or ...Bg4

**13.Nb5**

Seems to tip the game just barely over the line to +=; White gets at least a Bishop for a Knight.

**13...Qb8**

Forced

**14.Nxd6 Qxd6 15.Nf3 a5**

I thought 14...h6 also good.

**16.Qd2**

Having the Queen on open diagonals seemed a good idea.

**16...Bh5 17.Rfe1 a4!**

I was still expecting 17...h6 but this is better.

**18.b4**

Exchanging the pawn gives Black at least equality; 18. Nd4 a3 19. Ba1 was worth considering.

**18...a3**

This is best: chase the Bishop and prevent 19. a3

**19.Bd4 Ra4 20.Rb1**

The Rook should be more useful on this file.

**20...b6**

Quiet but solid

**21.Be3**

What else? 20. Nh4 was silly, and this diagonal for the Bishop might be good in the long term.

**21...c5 22.bxc5?!**

Probably better was 22. h3 Bxf3 23. bxc5 bxc5 24. Bxf3, leaving Bishop versus Knights

**22...bxc5 23.Rb5**

23. Qc2 or 23. h3 might have been better; I expected to follow eventually with Re1.

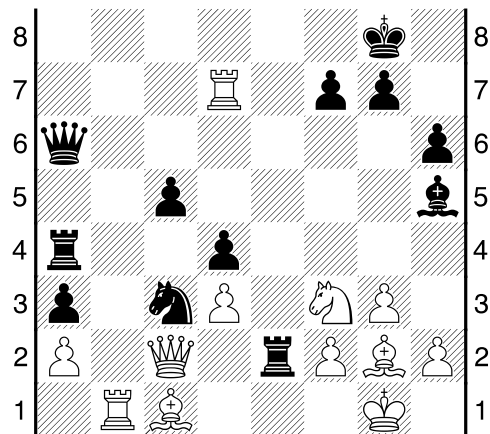
**23...h6 24.Qc2 Qa6! 25.Reb1 d4  
26.Bc1 Nd5 27.Rb7 Nc3**

Threatening the Rook and the e-Pawn.

**28.Rxd7**

Not much choice

**28...Rxe2**



28...Nxb1 29. Qxb1 +=

**29.Bd2**

This seemed to leave some play; the alternative was 29. Rb8+ Kh7 30. Qb3 Bxf3 31. Bxf3 Re1+ 32. Kg2 Qxd3 33. Kh3 Qxf3 24. Rxf7 =

**29...Nxb1**

A different but interesting path was 29...Qf6 30. Rb8+ Kh7 31. Qb3 Bxf3 32. Rxb4 cxb4 33. h3 Qf5 34. Bxc3 dxc3 35. Rd5 Rb2 36. Rxf5 Rxb3 37. Nd4 Rb1+ 38. Kh2 Bg6 39. Rc5 Bxd3 40. Bd5 Rb2 41. Nc6 Bxa2 43. Bxa2 Rxf2+ 44. Kg3 Rxa2 45. Nxb4 Rb2 46. Rxc3 Rxb4 47. Rxa3 and Black can say at least that it was White who had to draw.

**30.Qxb1 Qf6 31.Qb8+ Kh7 32.Qb7 Bg6**

**Obituary: Richard Anthony Cayford**

I have learned, belatedly, that (Richard) Anthony Cayford of Manchester, NJ, born on 3 December 1939, died on September 22, 2005 .



Tony Cayford was Canadian CC Open Champion (1962) finished second (1964) and two times Golden Knights champion 1972 and (tied) 1973. Tony was the winner of the First US Championship (1974-6) and winner of the First Anglo-Pacific Tournament Bureau Championship (1992) He was awarded the ICCM title in 1995 and the SIM in 2000.
